Sean Fleming kicks his way into Hall

To be inducted with Lalji, Lee, Kirkby and Vanderstarre on April 10

Football is at the forefront for two members of the Burnaby Sports Hall of Fame's Class of 2025.

Long-time Canadian Football League kicker Sean Fleming and CFL Hall of Fame and BC Football Hall of Fame inductee Farhan Lalji of TSN will be inducted by the Hall at a banquet to be held at the Riverway Golf Course on April 10, 2026. Fleming will be joined in the athlete category by lawn bowler Josephine Lee while lacrosse organizer Susan Kirkby will also become an honoured member as a builder. Burnaby Speed Skating Club's Adriana Vanderstarre will be inducted into the coaching category.

ATHLETE: SEAN FLEMING Football

Sean Fleming, born and raised in Burnaby, spent 16 seasons in the CFL kicking for the Edmonton Eskimos. He set club records for points (2,571), field goals (553), converts (713), punts (1,264), punt yardage (52,957) and kickoff yardage (69,973).



Growing up, Fleming attended Parkcrest Elementary and played soccer for Cliff Avenue United and baseball for the Burnaby Baseball Association. He went on to play in five Grey Cups, winning three, and was named the 1983 Grey Cup's Most Valuable Canadian. He kicked the game-winning field goal in overtime in the 1995 Grey Cup. He's a four-time West Division all-star and two-time CFL all-star.

After graduating high school from Vancouver College, Fleming was recruited to the University of Wyoming where he still holds almost every Cowboys place-kicking record including scoring 324 points in his four years there. As a pro, he had brief stints in the NFL with Washington and Kansas City before joining Edmonton, who selected him sixth overall in the 1992 CFL draft. He was inducted into the team's Wall of Honour in 2011.

Lalji has become one of Canada's foremost football experts, on many levels, as well as being a community builder for the sport in the province. He moved to Burnaby with his family when he was six. Lalji played football for Burnaby Central and after graduating in 1986 he helped coach the team from 1987 to 2000. He did a stint as Simon Fraser University's sports information director in the early 1990s before becoming a sports reporter for CBC Vancouver in 1995. He joined TSN as a regional reporter in 1997 and while he covers the regional sports for the network he became one of TSN's football experts. Lalji has covered 22 Grey Cups, 16 Super Bowls and 12 NCAA championships. He is frequently seen on the sidelines of CFL games as a reporter for TSN and occasionally is in the booth as a play-by-play announcer as well as anchoring TSN's coverage of the annual CFL Canadian college draft. His in-depth knowledge of football at all levels — professional, collegiate and even high school — is not only on display on TSN throughout the year but also as a frequent expert commentator for many broadcast and podcast outlets on both sides of the border.

Lalji also reports extensively on the Vancouver Canucks and has covered Stanley Cup finals, NBA finals, MLB and NBA all-star games, the U.S. Open and PGA golf championships and three Olympic Games.

His community contributions have also earned him a place in the BC Football Hall of Fame. In 2003, Lalji revived the dormant football program at New Westminster Secondary School, not only serving as its head coach but also cultivating sponsorships for the program to help it thrive and assisting many of its players obtain post-secondary scholarships. The BC Football Hall said "there are few individuals who have had as profound an impact on the growth of high school football in BC than Farhan Lalji." His efforts in growing support for the organization included obtaining sponsorship from Subway for the provincial championship games to be held in BC Place and to appear on television from 2002 to 2012. Lalji pioneered the provincial high school football all-star awards dinner and annual all-star games and went on to serve as BC High School Football president from 2010 to 2012. During that stint one of his major accomplishments was developing a safety policy around concussion prevention.

ATHLETE: JOSEPHINE LEE Lawn Bowling

When Josephine Lee came to Canada, specifically Burnaby, in 1994 to escape continued unrest from the 1989 Tiananmen Square massacre in China, she was looking for something new to spark her interest. So Lee and husband Freeman Watt turned to lawn bowling, a sport Watt had been fascinated with since he was a boy in Hong Kong. Lee became so proficient at bowls she got to travel the province, country and the world to compete. Since 2001, she has won 37 provincial medals (24 gold) and 19 national medals (10 gold). Internationally she has won two gold medals at the US Open, a silver medal at the 2009 Hong Kong Open and represented Canada at the 2008 Asia Pacific Games and the 2010 Commonwealth Games in New Delhi, India. Lee continues to compete and serve as a mentor to aspiring young bowlers.



BUILDER: SUSAN KIRKBY Lacrosse

Susan Kirkby has been a Burnaby Minor Lacrosse Club executive and its registrar since 2004. She also served as second vice-president and first vice-president of the BMLA between 2009 and 2022 and has been its president since 2022. Following in the footsteps of Burnaby's *Mr. Lacrosse*, Jack Crosby, (a Burnaby Sports Hall of Fame Honoured Member since 2001) Kirkby became the head organizer for the minor lacrosse Novice tournament named after him that began in 2004. Kirkby's tireless efforts have been recognized with awards both by Burnaby Minor Lacrosse and the BC Lacrosse Association, which gave her the Ruth Seward Award, which recognizes extraordinary contributions to a local association, in 2011.

COACH: ARIANA VANDERSTARRE Speed Skating

Speed skating is in Ariana Vanderstarre's DNA and she has proudly carried on the family tradition.

Vanderstarre has spent more than 30 years coaching at the Burnaby Speed Skating Club (BSSC) taking skaters to competitions around the province and the country. It was a natural transition considering her mother, Agatha, had been inducted into the Burnaby Sports Hall of Fame in 2007 for growing the BSSC into one of the biggest in the province. After competing for Team BC, Ariana Vanderstarre turned to coaching in 1994 becoming a national level coach. Her skill has led to countless medals for not only BSSC skaters but also ones from around the province. In the 2024-25 season alone, Vanderstarre accompanied skaters from various age classes to more than 20 meets in BC and Canada. BCSS has won the points title at four short track provincial championships as well as the 2011 provincial long track championship. She has been appointed by the Speed Skating BC almost 50 times to work with Team BC skaters at competitions such as the Canadian Youth Championships and the Canada Winter Games. Her Masters skaters have, at various times, held Canadian and world short track and long track records in their age categories.
